Information Sheet “3Ps” for Non-Degree-Seeking Graduate Students

- ❖ Students who do not wish to enroll in the MSN program at WNMU still may enroll in one or more of the “3P” courses:
 - (1) NUR 505: Advanced Pathophysiology Across the Lifespan;
 - (2) NUR 510: Advanced Health Assessment Across the Lifespan; and,
 - (3) NUR 515: Advanced Pharmacology Across the Lifespan.

- ❖ Requirements to take one or more of the “3Ps” are as follows:
 - Apply as a non-degree-seeking graduate student at WNMU.
 - Complete the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU).

“3P” Courses

Semester	Course
Fall Semester	NUR 515: Advanced Pharmacology Across the Lifespan
Spring Semester	NUR 505: Advanced Pathophysiology Across the Lifespan NUR 510: Advanced Health Assessment Across the Lifespan

- ❖ Any student who wishes to change from non-degree-seeking to degree-seeking must complete an entirely new graduate application for admission to the Graduate Division.
 - The application fee will apply again.
 - Official transcripts must be submitted to the Graduate Division.
 - Then, a programmatic application must be done to apply to the School of Nursing.

- ❖ For non-degree-seeking students, the University will accept a maximum of nine credit hours towards enrollment in the MSN degree program.
 - Any credit hours beyond this will require declaration of degree-seeking status.
 - If the student seeks to earn the MSN degree, then all of the “3Ps” (equivalent of nine credit hours) may count provided all were taken within the WNMU School of Nursing.

- ❖ For transfer students from other colleges and universities, only this combination of courses (equivalent of nine credit hours) may be applied towards the MSN degree:
 - One of the “3P” courses;
 - A graduate-level theory course (may be taken outside of the University); and,
 - A business course equivalent to that offered by the WNMU MSN plan of study.
